On January 15, 2025, the El Paso Metropolitan Planning Organization (EPMPO) hosted a public meeting to discuss the development of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2025-2052 (MTP), also known as the Regional Mobility Strategy. The meeting, attended by over 90 participants, was conducted in an open house format, allowing attendees to engage in interactive public engagement activities. Participants included a diverse mix of residents, community leaders, and key stakeholders, such as representatives from local municipalities, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), and the El Paso County Judge's office. Attendees provided valuable input on the plan's goals and objectives, shared their transportation priorities, and participated in ranking activities to assess the most critical mobility goals for the region's future.

## Open House Exhibits

A series of 13 bilingual, English and Spanish, exhibits were prepared and displayed at the public meeting. Three of those exhibits were interactive activities encouraging the public to provide their feedback, and ten of the exhibits were informational intended for the community to view and discuss with EPMPO staff. The ten informational exhibits included:

- ➔ Welcome – Welcomed the community into the public meeting
- ➔ What is the Metropolitan Transportation Plan? – Provided an overview of the planning process and requirements of the MTP.
- ➔ MTP Schedule – Provided a summary of key milestones for preparing the MTP.
- ➔ Regional Population – Map displaying current population by Census tracts for the EPMPO region.
- ➔ Roadway Traffic – Map displaying traffic volumes (AADT) for major roadways in the region.
- ➔ Fatal Crash Hotspots – Map identifying high fatal crash locations across the region.
- ➔ Freight Network – Map displaying critical freight infrastructure to the EPMPO region.
- ➔ Public Transportation – Map displaying the transit system provided by three service providers within the EPMPO area. Sun Metro provides service in the urban parts of the region, while El Paso Transit Authority (ETA) and South-Central Regional Transit District (SCRTD) provide rural services.
- ➔ Bicycle and Pedestrian – Map displaying bicycle facilities in the region.



- ➔ Tell Us Your Thoughts – Provided a QR code and weblink to encourage the community to provide their feedback online or in-person at the interactive stations at the open house. Laptops were available for the community to participate.











The exhibits utilized for the public meeting and a summary of the feedback received at the activities is included in the following sections.

## Goals and Objectives Activity

Interactive boards invited participants to rank ten goals and objectives based on their importance, assigning a score from 1 (most important) to 5 (least important). This feedback provided insight into public priorities for regional transportation planning. The findings from this ranking exercise are summarized below. The feedback received from the Goals and Objectives activity will assist the project team in validating the MTP goals and objectives and identifying regional transportation needs.

- ➔ People had the opportunity to place stickers under different goals and objectives they would like to see achieved in their community. These goals and objectives covered a wide range of topics, including safety, equity, environmental sustainability, and more.
- ➔ Participants ranked the ten goals and objectives presented based on their personal importance, assigning a score from 1 (most important) to 5 (least important) (see Table 1 below).

## Transportation Issues and Needs

An interactive board invited participants to draw their transportation issues and needs directly onto large maps of the region. This activity encouraged attendees to visually highlight problem areas, propose new routes or infrastructure, and illustrate specific challenges, such as congestion, safety concerns, or lack of connectivity. Facilitators were available to answer questions and help participants label and describe their issues and needs.

Results are aggregated by region and can be seen in **Tables 2, 3, 4, and 5** below.

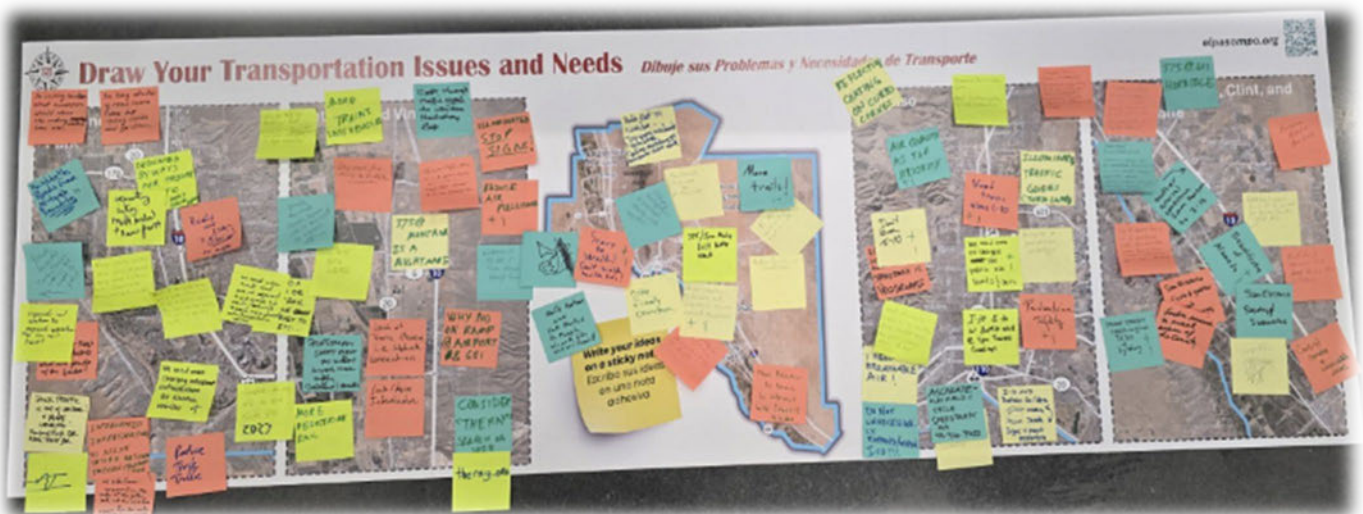
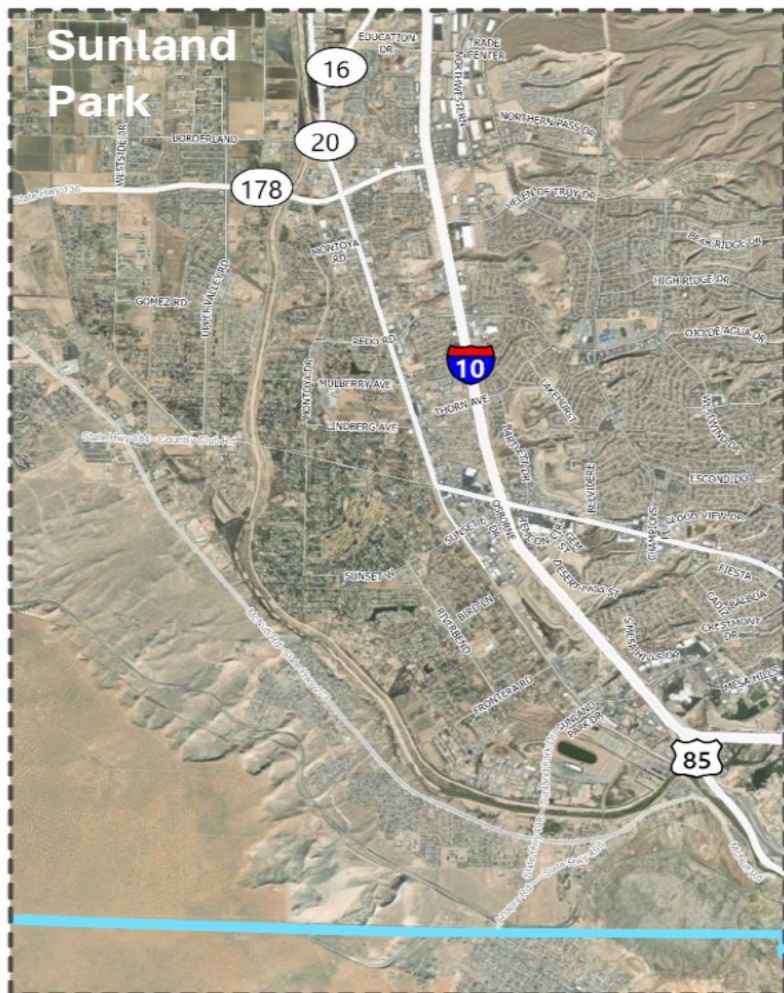




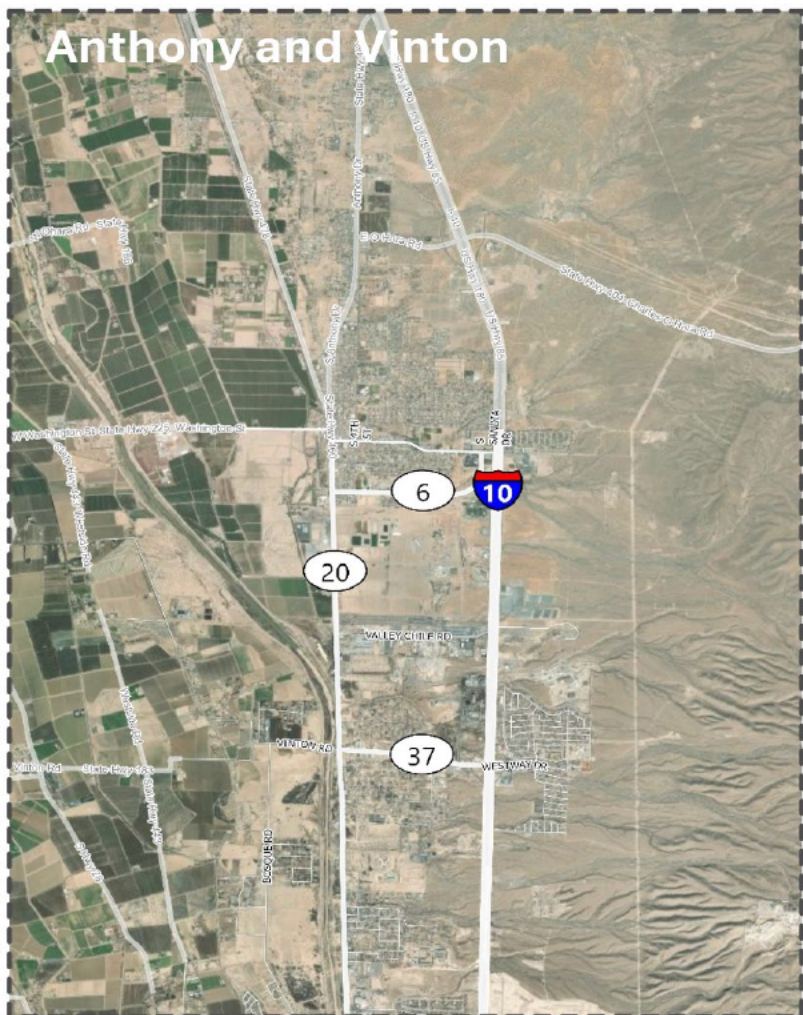

The El Paso The El Paso Metropolitan Planning Organization (EPMPO) hosted a series of public meetings between April 22<sup>nd</sup> and May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2026, to gather input on the Draft 2052 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), the 2027–2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), and the Transportation Conformity Report (TCR).

This summary focuses on the two meetings supported by WSP, held on April 22<sup>nd</sup> and May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2026. The Draft 2052 MTP is a long-range transportation plan that identifies regional priorities, projects, programs, and policies through the horizon year 2052. The 2027–2030 TIP is a short-range program outlining projects and strategies anticipated for implementation over the next four years. The TCR evaluates whether planned transportation projects conform to applicable air quality requirements.

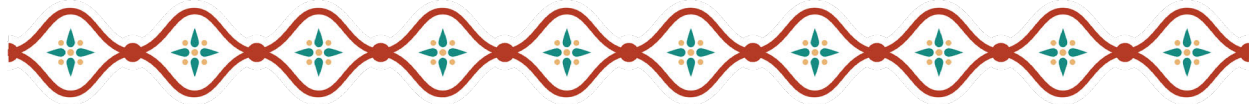
Attendance totaled 17 community members at the April 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting and 20 community members at the May 6<sup>th</sup> meeting, excluding staff. Sign in sheets can be found in *Appendix A*.

notifications. Copies of these outreach materials and public notifications are included in *Appendix B*. Media coverage related to the public meetings is included in *Appendix C*.

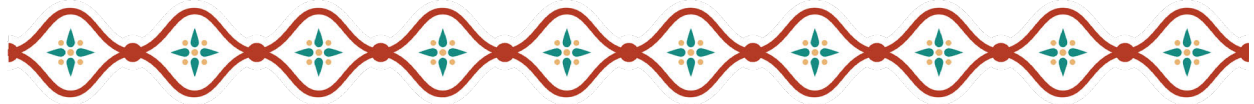

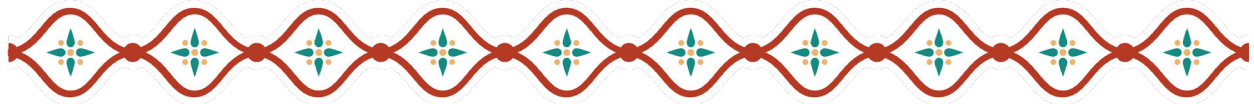
La Organización de Planificación Metropolitana de El Paso (EPMPO) inició el período de consulta pública del borrador del Plan Metropolitano de Transporte 2052 (MTP), un documento que trazará el rumbo del desarrollo vial e infraestructura de la región durante los próximos 26 años.

El período de comentarios, abierto desde el 18 de abril, cerrará el 17 de mayo. Las autoridades locales hicieron un llamado a residentes, líderes comunitarios y sectores interesados a participar en una serie de reuniones públicas donde podrán revisar el plan, plantear dudas y aportar propuestas antes de su aprobación final. Los borradores del MTP y del Programa de Mejoras del Transporte (TIP) están disponibles en el sitio web de la agencia: [www.elpasompo.org](http://www.elpasompo.org).

El director ejecutivo de la EPMPO, Eduardo Calvo, subrayó que el ejercicio es fundamental para anticipar los retos que enfrentará la ciudad en materia de movilidad, crecimiento urbano y calidad de vida.

#### Publicidad

“Uno de los principales trabajos que realizamos es proyectar cómo va a crecer nuestra población y el empleo, pero sobre todo entender hacia dónde se va a expandir la ciudad. Eso nos permite identificar dónde se necesitarán proyectos de transporte”, explicó.



Calvo señaló que, aunque el crecimiento poblacional en El Paso no es tan acelerado como en otras ciudades del estado, la expansión territorial ha sido constante, lo que genera mayores distancias de traslado y presión sobre la infraestructura existente. “Tenemos el mismo número de personas, pero viviendo cada vez más lejos. Eso incrementa la congestión y complica el funcionamiento del transporte público”, advirtió.

El MTP 2052 es un plan a largo plazo que identifica las prioridades de transporte para la región e incluye recomendaciones para proyectos, programas y políticas en todos los modos de desplazamiento —conducción, ciclismo, tránsito peatonal y transporte público— desde 2026 hasta el año horizonte de 2052. El TIP 2027-2030, por su parte, es un programa de corto plazo que describe los proyectos y estrategias derivados del MTP planificados para su implementación en los próximos cuatro años.

El plan contempla no solo la construcción o ampliación de vialidades, sino también estrategias para mejorar la seguridad vial, fomentar el transporte público y contribuir a una mejor calidad del aire. En este último punto, Calvo subrayó que todos los proyectos deben demostrar que contribuyen a reducir emisiones contaminantes. “Si no están incluidos en el plan, simplemente no pueden acceder a fondos federales”, precisó.

## **Publicidad**

Uno de los desafíos más relevantes del plan es cambiar el modelo de crecimiento urbano disperso por uno más concentrado, lo que permitiría mejorar la eficiencia del transporte público y reducir los tiempos de traslado. “Si logramos mayor densidad en ciertos corredores, podremos tener sistemas de transporte más eficientes. De lo contrario, con una ciudad tan extendida, el servicio se vuelve complicado y poco atractivo para la población”, explicó el director.

La consulta pública es un requisito establecido por la ley federal, pero también representa una oportunidad para que la ciudadanía incida directamente en decisiones que impactarán su vida cotidiana. “Es muy importante que la gente participe. Todos los comentarios se documentan y deben ser atendidos. Este plan no es solo técnico; es una visión compartida de cómo queremos que crezca nuestra ciudad”, enfatizó Calvo.

Las reuniones se llevarán a cabo en distintos puntos de la región para facilitar la participación de la población fronteriza. Las próximas fechas son el 30 de abril en el Parque Urbano The Beast, ubicado en el 13501 de Jason Crandall Drive; el sábado 2 de mayo en el Centro Multigeneracional de Sunland Park, en el 4700 de McNutt Road, y el miércoles 13 de mayo en el Centro Recreativo Nolan Richardson, en el 4435 de Maxwell Avenue.

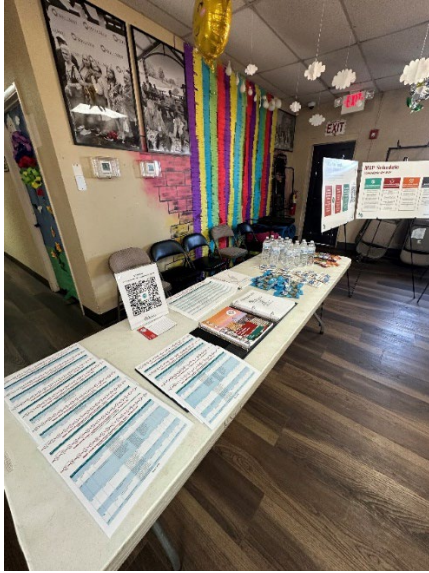

<p>Lora Holt (5/14/2026)</p>	<p>My Name is Lora Holt and I am the founder of Lesson Destinations, a curriculum writing business for non-profit organizations in Canutillo, Texas. My brother, daughters, and I have created a trading card game to teach people about food webs in the national parks. They are in the form of Pokemon cards. The players have to build photosynthesis in order to grow a plant, the plants attract foragers and those foragers attract predators that can either eat off of the players web or off their opponents... Each card lists diet and predators, but they also act as mini field guides in case a person wants to use the cards to look for animals. The symbols on the card denote activity (diurnal, nocturnal, etc) and also behavior (active year round, migrates, hibernates, brumates, etc). We are making them for the national park system (a different deck for each park). We are starting with the parks of the Chihuahuan Desert, which is where we live, but the story of our deck is actually deeper... and it has crossed paths with you and your committee.</p> <p>You see, we originally designed these cards to depict the animals of the Rio Bosque Wetlands in El Paso, Texas. The Rio Bosque Wetlands is a park that is literally on the US/Mexico Border. I was writing a curriculum for El Paso Water to teach students science lessons that involved water and this lesson was about how this wetland was killed because of the Chamizal Agreement in the 1960's. The US Mexico border follows along the Rio Grande River, however when the river changes course it means parts of the US end up in Mexico and parts of Mexico end up in the US (side note: This happened to my grandmother and a house that she owned, because of the river changing course, her house ended up in Mexico.) This was especially troubling for the city of El Paso because their downtown area would sometimes end up in Mexico because of the changing river, which made businesses and land owners very upset. During the Chamizal Agreement, the US and Mexico decided to channel the river in El Paso by cementing in the riverway so that the river would always stay the same. People were paid for their properties in the final river path change (my grandma lost her house) and the channel was cemented in. The Chamizal Park was erected on both sides of the border to commemorate the agreement. Our Chamizal Park is a national monument in El Paso, but it is just a park with trees and grass and a nice amphitheater, but it is not a nature park. You see when they channeled the river, they cut off water to wetlands that existed along the river. These wetlands were necessary for migrating birds that came to roost during the winters.</p> <p>In the late 70's-Early 80's El Paso Water, the University of El Paso and the Army Corps of Engineers decided to create a park south of downtown El Paso near the Bridge of the Americas to revive a wetland that was killed off during the Chamizal. they filled the empty river path and wetland cells with water during the winter months and guess what? The animals came back! We have Cottonwood trees, saltbush, coyotes, all kinds of wetland animals, including a BEAVER, that have made a home in our Rio Bosque park. These animals were not planted there, they CAME because the water was back.

So about 5 years ago, the water company hired my family to create educational materials for this park. We created videos, comic books, lesson plans and one special game that we retained the copyright for, because the game came out extra special. When I went out to the bosque I noticed that two different habitats coexisted and overlapped with each other. A habitat of the desert scrub and a habitat of the wetland. Growing up in the desert of El Paso I never realized that the desert had beavers, or muskrats or even crayfish and frogs. I never stopped to think about it, and that all of those animals had special adaptations and behaviors that allowed them to exist in this environment. I asked my daughter (an illustrator) to design a card so that I could create a food web game that depicted the overlapping habitat. At first I thought we would have about 20-30 cards in the game, but when I was done mapping out the webs the card game grew to 60 species of plants, animals, insects, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish and although there are 60 species in our deck, it is only a fraction of the animals and plants that reside at the Rio Bosque Park. It took a lot of time to create, in fact we didn't get to finish the deck before COVID hit. We were doing this project after work as a side job and it took a while to develop. I'm enclosing links to the videos my brother created on the park so you can see some of the finished project.

In 2023 I retired from my district to take care of my father who had alzheimers. As a side project I decided to revise the cards so that we could market them to the national parks. My dream is to make animals and plants as important to kids as Pikachu. My daughter, Wyndi, is re-illustrating each card so that the pictures are more alluring to nature lovers. We have 13 species to go. In the meantime I am revising and editing all of the cards so that all of the cards have credible citations for the information that they present and are scientifically accurate. We hope to launch them on Kickstarter at the end of the summer. The Chihuahuan Desert is the most biodiverse desert in the world, and oddly enough, this park represents a habitat similar to the one found at Big Bend National Park. I have done a cross reference of the animals in our deck and 95% of the species we are illustrating are also found at Big Bend National Park, it is almost as if we have the diversity of a national park in our own backyard.

I don't have to tell you that this park is a hidden gem. I visit this park every season to see the changes in the park. Did you know that the Black-Necked Stilts that reside there in the winter have special adaptations that allow them to wade and forage for crustaceans without sinking into the mud? The gray fox that lives there is the only species of fox that can climb trees like a cat. The Harris hawk (an apex predator at the park) actually hunts in groups to corral its prey. The

	<p>cottonwood trees that grow in the wetland once lined Alameda Street, which now has no cottonwood trees along its very long road. Lois Balen, a wildlife conservationist, studies burrowing owls at the park and has made discoveries about the species behavior thanks to video cameras left in the man made burrows placed there for the owls at the Rio Bosque. Teachers go there for education inservice trainings, children go there for field trips, UTEP students go there to study the biodiversity, the list of the Bosque's importance and usage goes on and on.</p>
